

UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON, BOTHELL

quick facts

The University of Washington, Bothell campus is located on approximately 132 acres, including 62 acres of protected wetlands, within the city limits of Bothell, Washington on what was known as the Truly Farm/Stringtown parcel. The campus connects the Sammamish River Trail to the North Creek Trail, which extends to Lake Washington and ends at Lake Sammamish.

Campus Buildings

There are ten campus buildings totaling approximately 815K square feet of office, classroom, and structured parking facilities. The campus has over 1.5 miles of roadways and paved surface parking and 1,951 parking spaces.

Chase House

The "Chase House" is a registered historic structure, the home of Bothell's first physician, Dr. Reuben Chase. Dr. Chase occupied the house as early as 1889 and used it as both an office and the community's first hospital. The doctor is credited with stopping a typhoid epidemic in Bothell.

UWB/CCC Enrollment

The total campus headcount, including 1,614 UWB students and 2,200 CCC students, totals 3,814. The total population of the City of Bothell is 32,900. This makes the co-located campus almost 12% of Bothell's population. At full buildout of the campus, we will be about one half the size of the entire City of Bothell.

Campus Art

In addition to the extensive art collection housed in the Library and the outdoor art pieces, campus buildings are decorated with the most extensive collection of Glenn Rudolph's photography on display anywhere in the country. Mr. Rudolph's subjects are the people and landscapes of rural Washington State.

Truly House

The Truly Farm property has been actively and continuously farmed by a series of owners including: George R. Wilson, who homesteaded the land in 1870, Benjamin and Lily Boone, who purchased it around 1924, and Richard Truly and the late Beverly Boone Truly, who acquired the site in 1962.
